Do you see it? Their repentance would necessitate some obvious change in conduct. Without that, their words would be shallow and meaningless.

We must be ready and willing to forgive those who sin. But just as God requires repentance, and the associated evidence of repentance, before He forgives, so must we. Jesus taught: "If thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him; and if he repent, forgive him" (Luke 17:3).

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DON'T ACT YOUR WAGE

A labor trend called "Act Your Wage" is gaining attention. This is the mindset that an employee's effort should correspond directly with compensation. If the person thinks his pay is insufficient for the tasks he is assigned, then he refuses to perform those tasks.

The counsel of God contradicts this mentality. "Bondservants, obey in all things your masters according to the flesh, not with eyeservice, as men-pleasers, but in sincerity of heart, fearing God. And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ" (Colossians 3:22-24).

Bondservants were addressed, not hired laborers. If even those under the yoke could be told to sincerely obey their masters, then those who apply for a job and agree to remuneration for their work can be expected to do as they're instructed. Such are certainly free to pursue other options if they are convinced better employment is available.

The reason masters can be obeyed heartily, even if they are harsh (1st Peter 2:18-24) is because the obedience is actually offered up to Jesus. This is true of wives subjecting themselves to their husbands (Ephesians 5:22), of children obeying their parents (Ephesians 6:4), and of all roles requiring submission under the sun. The manager or supervisor is really just a conduit through whom the worker is submitting to the Lord.

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
