him" (Proverbs 18:13). If there is more than one version of an event, then all perspectives ought to be considered before reaching any conclusion.

It must be understood, though, that a conclusion is not always warranted. "He who passes by and meddles in a quarrel not his own is like one who takes a dog by the ears" (Proverbs 26:17). It is prudent to refrain from involvement in others' disputes. One of the many faults of a 24-hour news cycle and instant access to online information is that so many feel obligated to have an opinion about everything as if every single person is an equally authoritative expert on every subject all the time. Yet, it is contrary to godliness to be "a busybody in other people's matters" (1st Peter 4:15). Unless one is required by some circumstance to render a verdict, it is often best to remain undecided. Since even juries can deadlock in their deliberations, it is appropriate to remember that a conclusion may not be necessary.

When a decision must be reached concerning a matter, corroboration is required. A principle of justice honored throughout Scripture is that "by the mouth of two or three witnesses every word shall be established" (2nd Corinthians 13:1; Matthew 18:16; Deuteronomy 19:15). If a case rests on the testimony of less than two witnesses, then it has failed to be proven.

Even in situations in which multiple witnesses agree, their testimonies may be impeached. "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor" (Exodus 20:16) would be a pointless commandment if perjury was not a real threat to justice. False witnesses have conspired to end innocent lives, such as Naboth (1st Kings 21:1-13), Stephen (Acts 6:8-7:60), and Jesus Christ (Matthew 26:60). Caution must be taken so as not to believe what is false. All lies come from the devil (John 8:44) and believing lies results in condemnation (2nd Thessalonians 2:11).

While most subjects do not require a finding from every single person, divine truth can and must be settled straightforwardly. Jesus said, "If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31-32). Also, He said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (14:6), and "For this cause I was born, and for this cause I have come into the world, that I should bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth hears My voice" (18:37).

NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR DAMAGE?

But what about the Christian? "Whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them" (Matthew 7:12). If I would want someone else to take responsibility for damage they did to me, then shouldn't I also take responsibility for damage I've done to others? Christians not only take responsibility to help others that they have hurt, Christians follow Jesus by taking responsibility in helping others that others hurt! Consider the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37).

It might be a comforting thought that we could just put a sign up saying we're not responsible for damages that we cause, but honest hearts understand cause and effect and responsibility.

So, perhaps the sign we should put up instead should say, "I'm sorry for causing damage. Please tell me, and let me make it right." Yes, that sounds so much better. That sounds right.

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THE BALANCE BETWEEN GULLIBILITY & SKEPTICISM

As trust in government and journalism continues to erode, those who care about truth must contemplate whether to accept or decline official narratives.

Paul warned about being overly skeptical, saying, "If anyone teaches otherwise and does not consent to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which accords with godliness, he is proud, knowing nothing, but is obsessed with disputes and arguments over words, from which come envy, strife, reviling, evil suspicions, useless wranglings of men of corrupt minds and destitute of the truth, who suppose that godliness is a means of gain. From such withdraw yourself" (1st Timothy 6:3-5). The type of person who always surmises that everyone is lying is the type of person whom Christians must withdraw fellowship from.
